



SARAH R. BOLTON, PH.D.

Sarah R. Bolton became the 15th president of Whitman College in July 2022. Prior to her arrival at Whitman, she was the president of The College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio.

A physicist, professor and administrator with a distinguished career in higher education, Bolton has a long-standing commitment to inclusive excellence and the liberal arts. She is Whitman's first president in many decades to come from an academic career in the sciences. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Physics and Biophysics from Brown University, followed by a Master of Arts and a Doctorate in Physics from the University of California, Berkeley.

Bolton began her career as a faculty member in the department of Physics at Williams College in 1995. After fifteen years in teaching and research, she moved into the role of Dean of the College.

In 2016, Bolton became the President of The College of Wooster. Under her leadership, the college advanced inclusive excellence, becoming one of the most diverse and international liberal arts colleges in the country, adding five new majors while significantly increasing faculty diversity, and introducing minors and experiential pathways in emerging fields. Bolton also led work to strengthen student life, including through a major renovation of the student center and dining hall, while guiding the college through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Bolton has served on the boards of the Association of Presbyterian Colleges and Universities, the Annapolis Group, the Five Colleges of Ohio, Great Lakes College Association, and Culture of Respect.

Since her arrival at Whitman, Bolton has immersed herself in campus life, engaging with students, faculty, staff and alumni to hear many perspectives on the college. Bolton has launched a collaborative strategic planning process with input from hundreds of campus constituents and alumni focusing on key priorities, including academic excellence, student life, diversity, equity and inclusion, sustainability and preparation for life and work after Whitman.

Sean Decatur, Ph.D.

Sean M. Decatur began service as the President of the American Museum of Natural History (AMNH) in April 2023 after serving for more than nine years as the president of Kenyon College. Prior to assuming the Kenyon presidency, Decatur served as a professor of chemistry and biochemistry and as the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Oberlin College from 2008 to 2013. From 1995 to 2008, he was a professor of chemistry at Mount

Holyoke College, where he led a research program in biophysical chemistry (with funding from the National Science Foundation and National Institutes of Health).

Decatur's writing has appeared online in the Washington Post, the Chronicle of Higher Education and the New York Times Room for Debate commentary forum. He has twice appeared at SXSWedu and been a guest on the Ezra Klein Show on Vox. He is the author of numerous scholarly articles and has received a number of national awards for his scholarship. Decatur was named a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2017 and was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2019.

BRIEF HISTORY OF WHITMAN COLLEGE

In December 1859, the Washington Territorial Legislature granted a charter to Whitman Seminary. College courses were first offered at Whitman in 1882 and in November 1883, the Legislature issued a new charter, changing the seminary into a four-year, degree-granting institution.

Throughout its history, Whitman has remained small to facilitate the close faculty-student interaction that is essential to exceptional higher education. In 1914, Whitman became the first college or university in the nation to require undergraduate students to complete comprehensive examinations in their major fields. The installation of a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in 1919, the first for any Northwest college, marked Whitman's growing reputation for academic excellence.

Today, Whitman remains a beacon of teaching and learning in the residential liberal arts tradition. Whitman is a place where curious and passionate students learn from accomplished faculty who structure courses and class time in ways that encourage students to push boundaries and explore new directions and perspectives.

A Whitman education requires both breadth and depth, as demonstrated by rigorous major requirements along with a recently updated general education framework. Students can choose from more than 60 majors, including interdisciplinary majors, or create an independently planned major. In all areas of study, Whitman students learn to read carefully, think critically and communicate effectively.

The college is committed to inclusive excellence—to creating a welcoming and equitable learning and working environment where all students, faculty and staff can thrive. This work includes collaboration with the the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation (CTUIR). In 2017, the college signed a memorandum of agreement with CTUIR to facilitate cooperation between the college and the tribes on the development of curriculum with a focus on Native American Studies, and Native American education, recruitment and retention efforts at Whitman.

Whitman College is located in Walla Walla, Washington, a city of approximately 34,000, on the traditional Cayuse, Umatilla, and Walla Walla homelands. Whitman's location fosters important environmental questions and unique learning opportunities that help link our students' learning in the classroom to the land. The town's setting among golden wheat fields, shadowed by the Blue Mountains, and the access to the greater region's mountains, rivers and wilderness provides an ideal jumping off point for a variety of outdoor pursuits and draws many students, faculty and staff to Whitman.

The Walla Walla region is a robust agricultural center for wheat, grapes, apples, alfalfa seed and related agricultural industries, including international agricultural manufacturing facilities. Walla Walla is known throughout the state, and increasingly nationally and globally, for its thriving wine industry and is home to more than 120 wineries, some of which were started by Whitman alumni. In addition to the famous Walla Walla Sweet Onions, the city is known for its vibrant and historic Main Street, Chamber Music Festival, Walla Walla Symphony, world-class restaurants, arts and theater scene, farmers market and annual hot air balloon festival. Residents and student volunteers give time to dozens of local nonprofits to help create a vibrant, thriving community.
