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THURSDAY, JULY 17: DEPARTURE* / ARRIVAL IN GUAYAQUIL, ECUADOR

Depart on a flight to **Guayaquil**. Upon arrival, transfer to the **Hotel del Parque Histórico Guayaquil**, a beautifully restored 19th-century property on the banks of the Daule River, for an overnight stay.

Depending on your arrival time, explore Santa Ana Hill, the picturesque neighborhood where the city began, offering a glimpse of what life was like in Guayaquil a century ago. A climb to the top unlocks panoramic views of Malecón 2000, the center of the city, as well as the Las Peñas neighborhood. Then visit Seminario Park, built as a memorial to the Venezuelan leader Simón Bolivar, to observe its slow-moving native iguanas. This evening, attend a welcome cocktail reception at the hotel.

*Depending on your departure city, an overnight flight departing on July 16 may be required to arrive in Guayaquil on July 17.

FRIDAY, JULY 18: GUAYAQUIL / BALTRA ISLAND / EMBARK SANTA CRUZ II / MOSQUERA

After breakfast, fly to **Baltra Island** and board **Santa Cruz II**. Once settled, attend a welcome and safety briefing.

Sail to **Mosquera Islet**, a small volcanic uplift located between Baltra and North Seymour Islands that features a long and narrow sandbank surrounded by lava reefs.

On approach, view the perfect rookery of young sea lions lounging on the soft white sands. After a wet landing, observe the sea lion colonies and gain insight into the fragile marine and terrestrial ecosystems of the Galápagos. Casually walk the flat sandy dunes and witness shorebirds, herons, lava gulls, and boobies. Return to the ship for a welcome dinner this evening. B,L,D

SATURDAY, JULY 19: SAN CRISTÓBAL ISLAND

Disembark at **Puerto Baquerizo Moreno**, San Cristóbal's capital, and venture to the island's southern shore. Discover the **breeding center for highly endangered giant tortoises** at Cerro Colorado. Located amid a fantastic deciduous forest, the breeding center is also home to dozens of bird species, including the island's endemic San Cristóbal mockingbird and San Cristóbal lava lizard.

In the afternoon, journey to the island's eastern tip at **Punta Pitt**, an eroded tuff cone, whose trail provides several spectacular viewpoints of the shoreline. This is the only site in the Galápagos where the three species of boobies the blue-footed, red-footed, and Nazca—can be found together. You will also find frigate birds and a sea lion colony. Walk or enjoy a ride on a *panga* (dinghy or Zodiaclike vessel) along the coast with opportunities for snorkeling and swimming. B,L,D





SUNDAY, JULY 20: SANTA FE ISLAND / SOUTH PLAZA ISLAND

Take a *panga* ride this morning over to **Santa Fe Island**'s idyllic sandy-white beach populated by many sea lions. Wander the island's prickly giant pear cactus forest and uncover the land iguana, the largest in the Galápagos. The Galápagos hawk, the Galápagos snake, various finches, and four species of Galápagos mockingbirds are also on display here. Further explore the island via snorkeling and swimming from the *panga*, observing from a glass-bottom boat, or kayaking.

Following lunch, travel to **South Plaza Island**, whose turquoise waters contrast brilliantly with the shoreline's white sand and black lava. Beyond, a carpet of scarlet succulents provides ground cover for a grove of luminescent, green, prickly-pear cacti. Yellow-gray land iguanas sit beneath these, waiting patiently for pears to drop. Unearth sea lion colonies, while frigates, swallowtailed gulls, and shearwaters glide and play with the thermals. Find Nazca and blue-footed boobies at play, along with red-billed tropicbirds. B,L,D



MONDAY, JULY 21: SANTA CRUZ ISLAND

Cruise to **Puerto Ayora** on **Santa Cruz Island** and visit the **Charles Darwin Research Station**'s giant tortoise breeding center. Developed in 1959, the station serves as headquarters for scientific investigation, conservation, and the National Park administration.

Continue to a completely different ecosystem at the island's cooler highlands for lunch. An afternoon exploration of the highlands will introduce you to giant tortoises freely roaming in the wild. Gaze upon a tree tortoise subspecies whose shells display both the saddleback and dome shapes and gain insight into the evolutionary process that molded them into the giant creatures they are today. Darwin's finches and the endemic *Scalesia* trees are found here as well. B,L,D

TUESDAY, JULY 22: ESPAÑOLA ISLAND


Trek to **Española**, the archipelago's oldest island, and begin by visiting unique seabird colonies, including the only nesting site for more than 10,000 Galápagos waved albatrosses, as well as swallow-tailed gulls, and both the blue-footed and Nazca boobies at **Punta Suárez**. Admire Española's famous "blow-hole," where water shoots 75 feet up in the air, and be on the lookout for red-greenblack marine iguanas and the nearly 1,500 tortoises that grace the island.

In the afternoon, meander **Gardner Bay**'s picturepostcard, white coral beach and the nearby **Osborn Islet** while observing sea lions, mockingbirds, and finches. Delight in snorkeling, swimming, and kayaking. B,L,D

WEDNESDAY, JULY 23: SANTA CRUZ ISLAND / NORTH SEYMOUR ISLAND

Observe blue-footed boobies diving into the water, reef sharks, and frigates at **Eden Islet**, located off the coast of Santa Cruz. Snorkel, kayak, or (*weather permitting*) ride in the glass-bottom boat and spot king angelfish, surgeonfish, parrotfish, damsels, rays, and even sharks.





After lunch on board, arrive at the island of **North Seymour**, an ornithologist's paradise. This prime marine bird fishing site is adjacent to the nesting site of two frigate bird species, the magnificent and common. All year along the island's south shore, these birds rest on the trees in the Palo Santo forest. Witness the mating dance of the blue-footed boobies and take in spectacular views of the channel. Sea lions, marine iguanas, swallow-tailed gulls, and herons may also grace your visit. This evening, attend a farewell reception and dinner toasting your time aboard *Santa Cruz II*. B,L,D

THURSDAY, JULY 24: BALTRA ISLAND / DISEMBARK / GUAYAQUIL

Conclude your voyage back in Baltra, disembark, and fly to Guayaquil. Before checking back in at the Hotel del Parque, enjoy a comprehensive interaction with the rich culture of Ecuador through a walking tour highlighting some of Guayaquil's most important and impressive landmarks.

That includes the **Crystal Palace**, a handsome steel structure built in 1907 that stands at the southern end of the *malecón*; the exquisitely designed **Moorish Tower**, and the **Governor's Building**, one of the city's most important structures, designed by Francisco Maccaferri with a blend of neoclassical and Baroque styles. Later, gather for a farewell dinner at the hotel. B,L,D

FRIDAY, JULY 25: GUAYAQUIL / RETURN

Board your independent flight home arriving either the same day or a day later. If your flight departs in the late afternoon or evening, day rooms are provided at the Hotel del Parque. B,L




SANTA CRUZ II
