Steps to Take

- 1. Build a resume and cover letter
- 2. Apply to the position on <u>Handshake</u>!
- 3. Interview with Whitman Staff
- 4. Complete Human Resources employment documents and training
- Forms to fill out with HR


Inquire with a polite cold email.

Handshake is a useful website where jobs are posted all the time from on and off campus opportunities.


Create an account with your Whitman email.



JOB FAIR Sample Questions to Ask Employers

-Introduce yourself:

- Hi, I'm [name], a [school year].
- My major is [...]/I'm interested in [...]/I'm just looking for a part-time job [...].
- I heard a lot of good things about [...] from [...].
- Are there any open jobs at [...] in [...] area?

-Ask specific questions about the employers and their open jobs:

- Can you tell me a bit more about [job]?
- On a typical day, what does [...] do?
- How many hours/week is this position?*

-Ask about the hiring process:

- Where can I find the job posting?/How do I apply?
- When can I start applying? When will I hear back from you?
- I'm an international student, can I work here? Do I need CPT/OPT? (off-campus)*

Interviewing Tips

Remember This!

- Clear and Concise
- On time or Early
- Attire is important
- ASK QUESTIONS!

Prepare for questions like:

Tell me about yourself! What are your strengths and weaknesses? Why do you want this job?

Notes

During the academic year:

- Domestic students on Work Study can work up to 19 hours/week on campus.
- Non-Work Study domestic students can work up to 20 hours/week on campus.
- International students can work up to 20 hours/week on campus. They cannot work for employers outside of the college, or receive payment from an employer that is not the college.

During spring, winter, and summer breaks:

• All students regardless of their Work Study status can get an additional job for up to 40 hours/week.

*** International students can work off campus, through internship grants, and by applying to Optional Practical Training (OPT) or Curricular Practical Training (CPT). Contact Greg Lecki for more information.
