"14 hours"—The Chinese Student Experience During the COVID-19 Pandemic



Out of approximately 150 international students currently attending Whitman, about 40 are citizens of the People's Republic of China. All Whitman's first-year Chinese students remain in China, studying online with a time difference of 14 hours, as do any Chinese students who left campus during the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic. Chinese students who stayed at Whitman experience other difficulties, including a lack of connection with non-international students, homesickness, and adapting to different cultures and languages.

Greg Lecki, associate director of the Intercultural Center for International Student Support Service, has compiled a report sharing some of the extraordinary challenges the pandemic has put on Whitman's Chinese student population. Through personal interviews with students both in China and on campus, he identifies several common themes as well as highlights the various ways Chinese students are responding (reaching out through WeChat, staying up until 4 a.m. to attend science labs synchronously, planning journeys complicated by significant visa and travel restrictions in order to be at Whitman for the upcoming fall semester).
