Whitman is a member of the Northwest 5 Consortium for Community Engaged Learning (NW5C), a cooperative that also includes Lewis & Clark College, Reed College, University of Puget Sound and Willamette University. Together, these five liberal arts colleges share resources, organize events and provide learning opportunities focused on revitalizing the arts and humanities in the Pacific Northwest.

Cases of COVID-19 have been found in people who are fully vaccinated, leading Umair Shah, the Washington State Secretary of Health, to issue the following note: "Finding evidence of vaccine breakthrough cases reminds us that, even if you have been vaccinated, you still need to wear a mask, practice social distancing, and wash your hands to prevent spreading COVID-19 to others who have not been vaccinated."

Kim and Leavitt Featured in Jews, Race and Religion Series

Helen Kim, professor of sociology and assistant dean for academic affairs, and Noah Leavitt, director of the Student Engagement Center, spoke to several hundred people during the "Funny – You Don't Look Jewish!" session of the Katz Center of University of Pennsylvania's Jews, Race and Religion series. Kim and Leavitt discussed their research that led to their book, "JewAsian," and also reflected on what the current state of anti-Asian violence and anti-racist initiative in the Jewish community.
