You are invited to the 2021 Hosokawa Journalism Lecture on Monday, April 26 at 6 p.m. This promises to be an exciting behindthe-scenes look at some of the biggest headlines of 2020 with an Emmy Award-winning broadcast journalist, Mireya Villarreal of CBS News. She will discuss her experience covering breaking news such as COVID-19 and also share insights on mental health and selfcare.

This is an annual event presented in conjunction with the Hosokawa Journalism Awards, which recognizes our student reporters at the Whitman Wire. This year's lecture is also part of the Race, Violence, and Health academic theme.



Q: What does it mean to be "fully vaccinated" for COVID-19?

A: According to the CDC, people are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after receiving the final dose of the vaccine. If it has been less than two weeks since your one-dose shot or the second dose of a two-dose vaccine, you are not fully protected.

Also, it's important to note that scientists are still learning how vaccines will affect the transmission of the virus that causes COVID-19. You may still spread the coronavirus even after being fully vaccinated, so you should keep taking precautions in public places like wearing a mask, staying 6 feet apart from others and avoiding crowds.
