Senator Patty Murray and Whitman Students Discuss Health Equity





In a special virtual event for the Whitman community, Washington State Senator Patty Murray took part in a panel discussion. The discourse centered on a report authored by Murray's office titled "COVID-19 & Achieving Health Equity: Congressional Action Is Necessary To Address Racism And Inequality In The U.S. Health Care System."

Three Whitman College student leaders served as hosts and panel members: Zidane Galant-LaPorte, a senior sociology major, Salma Anguiano, a junior Chinese and politics double major and Jasmine Razeghi, also a junior Chinese and politics double major. Whitman President Kathy Murray kicked off the event with an introduction to the report and the work of Senator Murray.

The discussion, prompted by questions posed by the three students, addressed topics from undocumented immigrants and health care access, to inequalities in vaccine distribution, workers rights and race and ethnicity data collection.

Q: Will getting the COVID vaccine affect my results in Whitman's pooled surveillance testing?

A: <u>According to the CDC</u>, no. None of the authorized COVID-19 vaccines cause you to test positive on <u>PCR/viral tests</u>, which are used to see if you have a current infection. This is the type of test we use for our campus COVID testing, so if you are randomly selected for surveillance testing you can take the test without worrying about receiving a false positive result.

Henry Leads Local Anti-Nuclear Weapon Effort

Pat Henry, emeritus professor, organized a successful campaign to have the Walla Walla City Council pass a resolution in support of the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. <u>World Beyond War reports</u>, "With a 5-2 vote, Walla Walla became the 41st U.S. city and the first city in the state of Washington to pass <u>ICAN's Cities Appeal</u>. The effort was also supported by Washington Physicians for Social Responsibility and ICAN, among other groups."

Ralston Publishes Op-Ed on Preventing Jury Bias

Jason Ralston, assistant professor or economics, with Charles North, associate professor of economics at Baylor University, published an <u>op-ed in Arkansas</u> <u>Business</u> analyzing the potential effect of a new law in Arkansas permitting jurors to donate their jury pay. Citing research they published in 2019 on a similar practice in Texas, Ralston and North discuss the possibility that the process may create juror bias and propose a simple solution.
