

Penrose Library Chosen as Grant Pilot Site

Penrose Library will be a pilot site for an 18-month Institute for Museum and Library Services National Leadership Grant awarded to LYRASIS, a nonprofit organization that supports open source technology applications for libraries and museums. The grant will support the migration of the ARMINDA repository website to new versions of its underlying software frameworks, Islandora and Fedora. ARMINDA holds library digital collections, including student and faculty scholarship, selected materials from the Archives, and digitized student newspapers. The ARMINDA team (Amy Blau, Kun Lin, Paige Morfitt, Dana Bronson, Ben Murphy and Rika Groff) will contribute their staff time to plan, support and evaluate the migration; in return, they will receive consultation and assistance from LYRASIS. Participation in the grant will realize significant cost savings for Penrose Library.

BRIAN DOTT (he/him) Professor of History

I teach about East Asian cultures in the History Department and the Asian and Middle Eastern Studies Program. My area of research is Chinese cultural history, especially from about 1500-1900. Cultural historians focus on how culture functions and changes over time. For example, in my_recently_published_book_about_the_chile_pepper in China, I explore the role of the chile in Chinese cuisine, medicine, gender construction and imagery.

What is your favorite aspect of the Whitman community?

I am drawn to the cross-disciplinary dialogues and engagement that faculty and students participate in. This intellectual atmosphere has allowed Heidi Dobson (Biology) and I to jointly offer the course History and Ethnobiology of the Silk Roads. I also really enjoy the experiential component of taking Whitman students to China.
