Teaching Hack of the Week

Here's a pressing question that many colleagues are asking: "What are your plans for uploading and storing recorded synchronous videos?!" Once again, there's a lot out there! Take a look at the following:

YouTube

- Pros: allows you to easily add timestamps and captions to your videos and control privacy options. Albert Schueller has created a <u>how-to guide</u>.
- Cons: may not be available to students in China; ask your students in China if they are able to access YouTube.

GoogleDrive

- · Pros: easy to use, lots of available space; access permissions to folders
- containing videos can be customized.
- Cons: not available to students in China.

Canvas

- Pros: available in any country, including China; one place, one course-site. WCTS provides useful how-to's on preparing and uploading videos into Canvas.
- Cons: video files need to be under 500MB each. (But there's good news: class periods up to an hour and 20 minutes tend to be below the threshold.)

Noteworthy

Cordner Wins International Society of Exposure Science AwardAlissa Cordner, professor of sociology, was the lead author of a paper on drinking water contamination which won the <u>International Society of Exposure Science (ISES)</u> 2020 Award for Best JESEE. This award is given to an ISES member for authorship of work published in the prior print volume year of the Journal of Exposure Science and Environmental Epidemiology (JESEE) that exemplifies innovative and creative research and scholarship.

Blavascunas Publishes Book on Belarusian Forest Eunice Blavascunas, professor of anthropology and environmental studies, has published "Foresters, Borders, and Bark Beetles: The Future of Europe's Last Primeval Forest." This ethnographic work provides an intimate account of the Bialowieza Forest on the Polish/Belarusian border to untangle complex forest conflicts between protection and use. Blavascunas looks at which pasts are celebrated, which fester and which are altered in the tumultuous decades following the collapse of communism.

Jackson Book Featured in The American Prospect Jack Jackson, associate professor of politics, had his new book featured in <u>The</u> <u>American Prospect</u>. In an interview, Jackson discusses his book "<u>Law Without</u> <u>Future: Anti-Constitutional Politics and the American Right</u>" (University of Pennsylvania Press), and about how authoritarianism seeped into the body politic.
