INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS AT WHITMAN COLLEGE



Representing 53 countries, there are currently about 160 international students enrolled at Whitman. Between 2015 and 2019, international students increased from 4.8% of the student population to 8.8% and numbers continue to rise.

Being an international student creates a unique set of academic, employment and legal circumstances in the best of times and has become increasingly complicated during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Office of Diversity and Inclusion has created an <u>infographic</u> detailing these conditions and some of the ways that Whitman is supporting international students through these challenges.

COVID-19 in Walla Walla

Currently there are 378 active cases of <u>COVID-19 in Walla Walla County</u>. Of these, 362 residents are isolating at home and 16 in the hospital.

Over the past week, four cases of COVID-19 were confirmed in Whitman students living in Walla Walla and follow-up protocols are underway. No new cases were reported in staff or faculty.

4 p.m. The Meanings of The Mayflower at 400

400 years ago this fall, a group of radical Christian separatists found England too intolerable and set sail upon the Speedwell for a life in Virginia. Whitman Psychology Lab Publishes Research

Associate Professor of Psychology Tom Armstrong, Mira Engel '18 and Siri Danielson '21 published an <u>article</u> in the journal Emotion establishing an eye tracking measure of disgust. The paper reports two experiments, each conducted at different sites using eye trackers installed by Armstrong and his lab members. Using the <u>Whitman Internship Grant</u>, Engel collected data at Meharry Medical College in Nashville, TN and Danielson collected data at Queens University in Kingston, Ontario.

Armstrong also recently published an <u>article</u> in the Journal of Experimental Psychology: General with Rachel Leiter '18, Alex Lee '18 and Zoe Brown '21 using eye tracking to demonstrate that disgust resists exposure therapy. Armstrong then helped collaborators at Cambridge University use this paradigm to determine if anti-nausea medication might facilitate exposure therapy for disgust. The encouraging results were just published in Current Biology in their article, "A Causal Role for Gastric Rhythm in Human Disgust Avoidance."
