# COVID-19 at Whitman

## Anderson Hall Quarantine

As you were made aware in an email last night from Peter Harvey, chair of the Coronavirus Task Force, nine positive COVID-19 cases were detected yesterday in students living at Anderson Hall. In consultation with our epidemiologist, we decided the most efficient way to stop the spread of COVID-19 on our campus was to quarantine all students who live in Anderson.

For the duration of this quarantine, all students in Anderson are restricted to their residence hall. They will move to remote learning, will have food delivered by Bon Appetit, and will not be going to Cleveland Commons or other buildings on campus.

We will be repeatedly testing the quarantined students to identify any new positive cases and have begun contact tracing to identify and follow up with close contacts. **If you have followed physical distancing and masking protocols, it is unlikely that you would have had close contact.** Close contact is defined by the CDC as someone who was within six feet of an infected person for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period starting from two days before illness onset (or, for asymptomatic patients, two days prior to test specimen collection) until the time the patient is isolated.

This situation highlights the importance of our COVID protocols. All of us must continue to social distance, wear masks, complete your daily wellness check, avoid gathering in groups and participate in surveillance testing.

We will continue to communicate with the campus community as this situation evolves.

## Everbridge Login Issues

Additionally, we are aware that some people are currently unable to log in to the Everbridge app. If you are in this situation, you should still be able to complete your wellness check via email today. The wellness check email should have arrived in your inbox at approximately 3 a.m. today. Once you have completed the wellness check, you will receive a badge via email and a confirmation text. You can then show either of these to indicate that you are approved to be on campus. We are looking into this issue and will let you know when we have further details.

# Q: What does it mean that Whitman's COVID-19 surveillance testing is "pool testing"?

A: Pooling—sometimes referred to as pool testing or pooled testing—means

combining respiratory samples from several people and conducting one laboratory test on the combined pool of samples to detect SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. Pooling allows laboratories to test more samples with fewer testing materials. If a pooled test result is negative, then all the samples can be presumed negative with the single test. If the pooled test result is positive, each of the samples in the pool will need to be tested individually to determine which samples are positive. <u>Learn more on the CDC website</u>.
