What Would You Put in a Time Capsule?



It was almost a year ago that Whitman made the decision to close campus to protect the community from COVID-19. And though the pandemic still isn't over, the roll-out of vaccines and the return to (modified) in-person classes signal the beginning of a new phase.

As we all reflect on the past year, the Whitman Magazine staff invites students, faculty and staff to share what items they would place in a time capsule to commemorate this tumultuous time. Perhaps it's a hand-sewn mask or a bottle of DIY hand sanitizer you mixed yourself because it was sold out everywhere. Or maybe it's a sourdough starter you nurtured in quarantine, or a book that gave you comfort when things looked bleak. Q: Should I be double masking?

A: Well, that depends. The <u>recent CDC study that investigated double masking</u> was looking specifically at how to improve the effectiveness of disposable medical masks, which tend to allow a lot of airflow due to the fact that they often do not fit tightly on the face. Adding a cloth face mask to a disposable medical mask provided additional layers of protection and improved the fit of the medical mask.

The generalized take-away from the study is that the <u>most important qualities for effective protection</u> are that a face mask includes multiple layers and fits snugly to the contours of your face. Therefore, double masking may not be necessary if you properly wear a multi-layered cloth mask with a middle filter layer, a nose bridge and adjustable ear loops like those Whitman provided (<u>non-Whitman-branded versions are available for purchase online</u>).

So, if you wear a disposable medical mask, a single or double layer cloth mask or any type of mask that does not fit snugly against your nose, cheeks and chin, you would have better protection by adding a second mask over it.
