## Anderson Hall Update

Upon receiving the results from last week's PCR tests Saturday, which were delayed by severe weather across the country, the COVID Task Force was informed that one student from Anderson Hall did test positive for COVID-19. This student previously tested negative via on-campus rapid antigen testing, and had not had any close contacts since testing positive. The student is now in isolation housing.

### Meet Whitman's New SAVA

# Q: Will getting COVID vaccine mean that you would have a positive COVID test?

A: <u>According to the CDC</u>, no. Neither the recently authorized and recommended vaccines nor the other COVID-19 vaccines currently in clinical trials in the United States can cause you to test positive on <u>viral tests</u>, which are used to see if you have a current infection. This is the type of test we use for our campus COVID testing.

If your body develops an immune response—the goal of vaccination—there is a possibility you may test positive on some <u>antibody tests</u>. Antibody tests indicate you had a previous infection and that you may have some level of protection against the virus. Experts are currently looking at how COVID-19 vaccination may affect antibody testing results. We do not offer antibody testing at Whitman.

#### 2021 Reunion Update

The Alumni Relations team, in conjunction with campus partners, has made the decision to postpone the 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion celebration for the Classes of 1970 and 1971 scheduled for Commencement Weekend.
