Present at the Whitman Undergraduate Conference



Proposal submissions for the 23rd Annual Whitman Undergraduate Conference are due Friday, Feb. 26. The conference, which will take place online April 13, is a daylong celebration of the scholarship and creativity of Whitman students.

The conference gives students from every academic area of the college the opportunity to share their research and creative projects with the campus community and interested public. It is noteworthy for its variety of presentations, from oral and poster presentations to musical performances to special exhibitions.

Conference presentations reflect original work produced by Whitman students through course study, senior theses, faculty-student collaborative research, independent projects, summer fellowships and internships and study abroad.

Q: Yesterday, the 500,000th American died from COVID-19. How does this compare to other countries?

A: The U.S., with a population of about 330 million, leads the world in number of total reported deaths. The second highest number of COVID-19 deaths is in Brazil, with just under 250,000 deaths in a population of 214 million. The U.S. also far exceeds other countries with over 28 million total cases of COVID-19, while India has recorded just over 11 million cases in a population of 1.3 billion. Schmitz Publishes Eleventh Book

David F. Schmitz, the Robert Allen Skotheim Chair of History, has just published his 11th book, The Sailor: Franklin D. Roosevelt and the Transformation of American Foreign Policy. It is a comprehensive reassessment of Roosevelt's foreign policy making and how the 32nd president transformed the grand strategy of the United States from one based on nationalism, neutrality and hemispheric defense to internationalism, with the U.S. becoming a world leader and pursuing policies of collective security, preparedness, alliances and participation in multilateral international institutions to secure peace and prosperity.
