Coronavirus News

The <u>Walla Walla County Department of Health</u> reported 35 new coronavirus cases in the past week. Of the total 187 confirmed cases, 126 residents are now recovered and 58 are in isolation.

A rapid response testing platform purchased by St. Mary's Medical Center through a combination of public and private funding will be operational within a week. <u>The Walla Walla Union-Bulletin coverage</u> notes that localized testing service is expected to be a critical aspect of reopening the economy.

Coronavirus Task Force Updates: Building Reopening Schedule

Over the next month many buildings around campus will reopen for a phased return to campus for employees. Faculty and staff will receive training and procedural information from Human Resources prior to being authorized to return to on-campus work. <u>View the tentative building</u> reopening schedule for July. Buildings reopened for authorized employees will remain closed to the public and visitors, and are not open for any general services.
