Life After Whitman: Lobbying for Change

Fifty years ago this month, the 26th Amendment was ratified, granting 18-yearolds the right to vote and immediately enfranchising more than 10 million new voters.

Although the 26th had the fastest path to ratification of any of the 27 Constitutional amendments—taking just 100 days to go from passage by Congress to becoming the law of the land—it took many years of lobbying by grassroots and community organizations to lay the groundwork.

A psychology major-turned-political lobbyist, Whitman alum Ian MacGowan '61 played a major role in the effort, leading the national campaign for the 18-yearold vote as director of the Youth Franchise Coalition.

Campus COVID-19 Update

Any employee who has not provided proof of being vaccinated against COVID-19 must take a coronavirus test every week in order to receive a campus access badge valid for seven days. This testing is offered at Welty Student Health Center on Tuesdays from 8:30–10 a.m. This week, 27 employees were tested and there were no positive tests.

Students in Walla Walla who wish to have summer access to campus must provide proof of receiving the COVID-19 vaccine and complete the request form in order to receive their access badge.

Current campus vaccination statistics:

Employees: 86% Students (classes of 2022, 2023 and 2024): 83% Combined total: 84%

Additionally, anyone not fully vaccinated must still wear a face mask in all indoor spaces and maintain 3 ft. physical distancing while on campus. A person is fully vaccinated when it has been at least two weeks since receiving the final required vaccine dose.
