What's an affinity group? Affinities are formed around mutual identity or identities (a singular identity or intersecting identities). Affinities provide a safe and supportive environment for shared experiences, a space to come together and be in community. Affinities are not required to open membership to all Whitman students, but rather they are open to all Whitman students who identify themselves with the stated identity/identities of the affinity group.

What's a club? Clubs are organizations that are recognized by the Associated Students of Whitman College (ASWC) and receive an ASWC funded financial budget. The Intercultural Center (IC) provides additional support. As ASWC recognized organizations, IC clubs are required to open membership to all Whitman students. To be recognized as an IC club, the club's purpose and goals must align with the Office of Diversity and Inclusion.

Q: Will getting a COVID vaccine mean that I will have a positive COVID test?

A: According to the CDC, no. None of the authorized COVID-19 vaccines cause you to test positive on viral tests, which are used to see if you have a current infection. This is the type of test we use for our campus COVID testing.

If your body develops an immune response—the goal of vaccination—there is a possibility you may test positive on some <u>antibody tests</u>. Antibody tests indicate you had a previous infection and that you may have some level of protection against the virus. Experts are currently looking at how COVID-19 vaccination may affect antibody testing results. We do not offer antibody testing at Whitman.
