Craft Your Future: How to Host a Meeting



There is no one way to run a meeting.

This was the opening message at a recent Craft Your Future workshop on meeting etiquette and management. The workshop, moderated by Nikki Brueggeman from the SEC, began with sophomore Sneh Chachra, ASWC president, and Antonia Keithahn, assistant director for disability support services, sharing brief presentations about structuring meetings that are accessible and inclusive.

A few tips include:

- Using the captioning features on platforms like Google Meet and Zoom during your meetings and allowing participants to use the video and audio settings that meet their needs and comfort levels.
- Sending timely agendas to allow others to contribute to the content of the meeting.
- Clearly communicating next steps, goals and expectations and allow time for everyone to be heard before closing your meeting.

Q: Washington state just moved to the next phase of vaccine distribution. Who is eligible to get the COVID-19 vaccine now?

- A: Phase 1B Tier 2 opened yesterday, which means the following people are now eligible to receive the vaccine:
- High-risk critical workers (includes agriculture, grocery stores and food banks, public transit, fishing vessel crews, corrections facilities like jails and detention centers, courts of law, and the remaining first responders including firefighters and police officers)
- Anyone 16 and older who is either pregnant or has a disability that puts them at risk of severe illness
- Educators and staff for pre-K through 12th grade (Phase 1B1)
- Child care providers (Phase 1B1)
- People 65 years or older (Phase 1B1)
- People 50 years or older who live in multi-generational households (Phase 1B1)
- People who work in healthcare settings (Phase 1A)
- High-risk first responders (Phase 1)

- People who live or work in long-term care facilities (Phase 1A)

The next first-dose vaccine clinic is Saturday, March 20. <u>Appointments can be made online</u> or by calling the Walla Walla County COVID helpline at 509-524-2647. Vaccines may also be available at local pharmacies including Rite Aid, Safeway and Albertsons.
