Learn the stories of nine Holocaust survivors who made their way to Washington State

The <u>Office of Religious and Spiritual Life</u> and <u>Kehillat Shalom</u> in partnership with the <u>Maxey Museum</u> present <u>"Stories Among Us"</u>, an installation on loan from the Seattle-based <u>Holocaust Center for Humanity</u>. The exhibit consists of nine stories from the Holocaust, as told through the experiences of survivors that live or have lived in Washington State.

Each survivor's story in this exhibit provides a different perspective of the Holocaust, from a refugee to a hidden child to a camp prisoner. Through personal stories, primary sources reproduced in this exhibit, and concise, engaging text, "Stories Among Us" is an opportunity for people to explore the connections between themselves and this important piece of history.

Visit the installation on campus April 1–8 at the Maxey Museum.

Yom Hashoah, or Holocaust Remembrance Day, is observed this year on April 8.

Q: If I don't have the card showing I got the COVID-19 vaccine, how else can I provide proof of vaccination or check what dates I received each dose?

A: People vaccinated in Washington can keep up to date with past vaccinations, get reminders for their and their family's upcoming routine immunizations and print official records using <u>MyIR</u>, the state's free online immunization records system.

Through MyIR people can see which COVID-19 vaccine they received and when. This information is helpful to ensure people who receive the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines are given the correct second dose within the appropriate window of time.
