Stevens is also excited to present its collaboration with Seattle artist Warren Pope, whose canvas and wire sculptures exploring social and environmental justice have been shown at the Northwest African American Museum, Vashon Center for the Arts and now here!

COVID-19 in Walla Walla

In the month of October, Walla Walla County confirmed a record 325 total cases of COVID-19. Currently there are 321 active cases, with 311 residents isolating at home and 10 in the hospital.

As the county continues contact tracing with people confirmed to have COVID-19, they are finding a high percentage of secondary transmission happening within households and through family and social gatherings where people spend long amounts of time gathered together indoors. The video above from the Washington Department of Health shares tips and considerations for how to safely spend time with the people you love this fall.
