Race, Violence and Health: **Upcoming Events**

Midway through the semester, Whitman's faculty, staff and students continue to integrate learning on race, violence and health into their academic and community programs. There are a number of upcoming events for the Whitman community:

- Nuclear Colonialism: Selecting the Irradiated. Wednesday, Oct. 28 at 7 p.m. This lecture will survey the history of atmospheric nuclear testing during the Cold War, the specifics of how communities were selected for irradiation, and their radiological legacies.
- Black Underrepresentation in STEM fields: Moving Beyond Deficit-Based Explanations. Thursday, Oct 29 at 4 p.m. This talk will draw upon insights from a trio of papers that point to alternative explanations for Black underrepresentation in STEM courses.
- Speak Out: Exclusivity in the Whitman College Climbing Center and Greater Climbing Community. Friday, Oct. 30 at noon. The next conversation in the Outdoor Program's series on recreation and inclusion.
- Queer Intimacy and Violence in a Mexican Border City Prostitution Zone. Monday, Nov. 2 at 5 p.m. Based upon twelve months of ethnographic research in 2008-2009 in a Mexican border city, this talk gives a queer reading to relations of love, obligation, and coercion forged in Reynosa's prostitution zone during a period of drug violence.
- Safe Zone Training. Multiple dates for students, staff and faculty. Safe Zone trainings are opportunities to learn about LGBTQ+ identities, gender and sexuality, and examine prejudice, assumptions and privilege.
