The Welty Student Health Center has flu vaccinations available to current employees by appointment only on Wednesday, Oct. 14. The reservation link will be sent today to faculty and staff authorized to be on campus. On Tuesday, Oct. 13 all employees will receive access to any remaining appointment times. There are a very limited number of vaccinations available for employees age 65 and older.

Whitman's employee health insurance covers the flu vaccination at no cost to employees. The vaccination is available through primary care physicians as well as at pharmacies at Safeway, Albertsons, Walgreens, Bi-Mart and Walmart.

Whitman is fortunate to have several students and staff participating in the new Student Civic Leader Fellowship initiative through Washington Campus Compact and made possible thanks to significant funding from the Washington State legislature. The program recognizes and supports students who are working hard to solve critical issues in our communities in five priority areas: food and housing insecurity, mental health, the opioid epidemic, the school-toprison pipeline, and K-16 civic education/engagement.
