Exploring the Academic Theme



Offerings exploring the <u>academic theme of Race, Violence, and Health</u> continue to roll out to the Whitman community.

Today at noon, join a class session of MUS 203, "Voices: Perspectives in Choral Music during the Pandemic" to discuss Joel Thompson's piece for men's chorus and orchestra, The Seven Last Words of the Unarmed. Thompson composed the piece in 2015 to honor the lives of seven unarmed Black men who were murdered by the police or vigilantes. He uses a sacred musical genre — the seven last words of Christ — to create a powerful secular testament to their lives and humanity by setting their final utterances to music.

On Monday, Sept. 21, at 4 p.m., join Co-Directors of the Sheehan Gallery Kynde Kiefel and Daniel Forbes, Exhibitions and Collections Manager of the Maxey Museum Libby Miller, and Penrose Library Archivists Ben Murphy and Dana Bronson for a 50-minute webinar (link coming soon). They will share a few pieces from Whitman's collections, connecting these items to this year's campus-wide theme of Race, Violence, and Health, and offer ideas for integrating collections, exhibitions and archives into classes and pedagogical projects. They will also speak to the transformative/reparative and activist possibilities found in the making, gathering and research of art/objects/texts.

Getting to Know...


RUTHIE COLBURN '22 (she/her)
