Teaching Hack of the Week

Many of us are asking our students to upload pdf files to Canvas. Many of our students are asking us to send them the pdf of a document they for whatever reason cannot access in time. Here's a trick that will save you a trip to the division office.

- Get the app Adobe Scan for your smartphone. It's free, and crossplatform. You'll need to create an Adobe account; if you're comfortable doing so, it's two clicks to use your Whitman Google account.
- The app automatically detects the borders of the page or the book and snaps the picture. Four blue dots, one at each corner, show you on your screen where it thinks the edges are. Note that the picture will actually include the entire screen, and so you can re-crop the scan in the next step if those borders are incorrect.
- All you have to do is hold the book open underneath, like you would on the Book-i at the library. The phone holder lets you have both hands free to turn and hold pages. The camera will take the picture each time; no need to grow a third hand to press the button. You'll hear the click and it'll save it.
- Need to scan a multi-page document? Just keep turning and holding the pages. It detects movement; when the movement stops, it tries again to take a picture. It automatically creates a single pdf out of the batch of pictures.
- If you're scanning more than a page or three, you'll want a flexible arm (gooseneck) phone holder that clamps to the edge of your desk. You can buy one online for about \$20.

When you're done, saving the scan automatically uploads it to the cloud in your Adobe account. From there you can download it or share a link. If the scan is in English and under 25 pages, it will also try to apply OCR.

It's amazing.
