Hispanic Heritage Month

Today marks the beginning of Hispanic Heritage Month. At first glance, this may generate positive thoughts of diversity and inclusion. We may think that Hispanic Heritage Month is similar to other heritage month celebrations (Black History Month, Women's History Month, Pride Month, etc.), as an opportunity to celebrate and acknowledge the valuable contributions made by one of the many communities that comprise our nation. In part, that is precisely what Hispanic Heritage Month is, an opportunity to reflect, affirm and bring those too often relegated to the margins to the center, even if just for four weeks.

Hispanic Heritage Month also provides us with an opportunity to interrogate and expand our understanding of pan-ethnic super-category classifications like "Hispanic". The common application to Whitman asks prospective students to indicate if they are "Hispanic/Latinx" in a manner similar to the U.S. Census. Like the Census, individuals are asked if they identify as "Hispanic" and then are asked to select from a predetermined list of pan-ethnic racial categories (White, Asian, Black, American Indian or Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander). The U.S. began collecting data on race starting with the first census in 1790. Data on "Hispanic" or Latino origin was collected for the first time in 1970, more than 150 years after the first decennial <u>census</u>, and respondents to the census were able to select more than one race for the race category for the first time in 2000.
