Why Have an Academic Theme?



ACADEMIC THEME 2021-2022 CLIMATE RECKONINGS, CLIMATE JUSTICE

Whitman College politics professor Shampa Biswas, who headed the organizing committee for last year's Race, Violence and Health inaugural academic theme, has published an opinion piece with Inside Higher Education to share the educational benefits of having a unifying theme for speaker events and academic programming.

Biswas writes, "In a year during which many of us were scattered and isolated across time and space, our attempt helped generate and sustain shared conversations across various disciplines and programs during a historic moment of significant pedagogic import. More important, it made it possible for us to offer a wide-ranging set of events and activities that will, we hope, sustain our work on racial justice for years to come."

In her opinion piece, Biswas focused on two of the academic benefits of establishing an organizing framework. "First, it enabled us to demonstrate the power of a well-rounded liberal arts education to help make sense of some of the most vexing and urgent questions of our time. Second, it connected curricular and co-curricular areas of the college in a shared campus-wide enterprise centered on rigorous academic work."

For the 2021-2022 academic school year, the Whitman campus community continues to come together for meaningful conversations and work centered around a new academic theme: Climate Justice, Climate Reckonings.

Debate Opens Season with First-Place Finish

Over this last weekend Whitman Debate kicked off their competitive season at the Rice University Classic. Four Whitman partnerships competed in parliamentary debate, with three entries qualifying for elimination rounds. The teams of sophomore Grace Canny and junior Heidi Adolphsen and sophomores Jas Liu and Kasey Moulton debated in the first elimination, with the team of senior Reeve Boyer) and junior Ilse Spiropoulos advancing to the quarterfinal round. In addition, Liu placed third in speaker points. Overall, the team tied for first place sweepstakes at the tournament, starting the season with one of their best finishes in recent years.


